"It has been said that philosophy is identical with its history. This means that philosophy is not a body of particular facts to be classified and studied systematically like the facts which form the subject matter of the sciences. Philosophy is a dialogue continued across the ages, a dialogue which first took shape in the streets of Athens and has gone on ever since, intermittently and yet without interruption, as new phases of human life and human knowledge have brought to light new interests. The term Personalism is descriptive not of the doctrine, but of the principle of interpretation followed by the author of this book. It is a distinctive title which is intended to associate the author with a group of philosophers, some living and some who are dead, who have influenced a wide circle of followers. The principle itself is not new and does not even claim to be novel. It is a form of idealism of the Leibniz and Berkeley type, an idealism which stresses the individuality of the real. Instead, however, of starting as Leibniz does with the metaphysical concept of the monad, or as Berkeley does with the psychological concept of spiritual substance, it takes as its primary unit the individual in its highest expression as an ethical and religious personality. As a metaphysical theory it is the conception of reality as a world of persons with a supreme person at the head. Personality is in effect the primary idea, and nature is a derivative idea. Nature is the expression of the world by persons and the means by which they intercommunicate. Personalism differs from most forms of idealism by the careful disclaimer of any argument based on the subjective nature of knowledge, and it differs from most forms of pluralism inasmuch as in affirming the reality of persons it does not imply the denial of impersonal reality in any form. It is as a method that it claims for its principle the highest philosophical value. Its principle is that the clue to the interpretation of reality is not to be sought for in the abstract concepts of the sciences, either the mathematical and physical sciences or the biological"--Introduction. Examines the perennial issues that keep science and religion at arm's length, clarifies those issues, and fits them into an historical framework—from Plato, to Aquinas, to today's thinkers.

This book is the final one in a series of four on Hegel as theologian, first presented as such in New Hegelian Essays (Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2012). In From Narrative to Necessity (2012) we then set forth the essential theme of Hegel's theology as the transcendence of "picture-thinking". In a third volume, Reason's Developing Self-Revelation (2013), we specified this same theme as humanity's accomplished future (ultimate end of life, the Idea). Here, finally, we discover the reconciliation of Mind with itself as the nerve of Hegel's thought. Hence, this book is subtitled "Logic as Form of the World", picking up on Gottlob Frege's rhetorical question, "What is the world without the reason?" The first chapter recapitulates that intimate union of God and man the Christian confessional movement would manifest, set forth here philosophically. This leads naturally to an identification of faith, the virtue, with the habit of rationality. Religious apologetic is found to fall short of philosophy, which forms a system (chapter 15). In "Logic and the World" (chapter 18) we further specify such logical knowledge as issuing in rational will, called love in J. M. E. McTaggart's Hegelian writings. Man himself, herself, is finally identified with Mind as both the uniquely determining "form" (the Idea) of our self-transcending nature, universalising the individual, individualising the universal, and, equally, form of "the world". Here the thrust of Hegel's metaphysics confirms those of Aristotle on this point. Last, after some historical and practical reflections (medieval thought, the clergy, Marxism), we end where we began, with the transforming effect of Hegel's thought as developing the doctrine of a divine creation in particular, while also developing the doctrine of this development itself, in anticipatory development, therefore, of J. H. Newman's classic essay of 1845 on The Development of Christian Doctrine.

Cosmic Reconciliation contains two other volumes: The All-Oneness of God and The Living Christ Consciousness. All three volumes are concerned with the reconciliation of all things through one's Christ Self unto the the God Self of the many within the one. If you can bear to hear now what many could not bear to hear two thousand years ago, you will not want to miss the good news of the reconciliation of all things unto God. To see the Christ as is, is to come to see God as God is, not what either might appear to be. The reconciliation of all things unto God is the reconciliation of an infinity of many unto the One, for the one and the many are realized to be two parts of the same thing. Now is the time to take responsibility for what you are in God, for now we can see how that an infinity of many share that responsibility with us. And in that sense, the burden is considered to be light (not heavy) burden.

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
